# **Texas Lutheran University**

Texas Lutheran University (TLU) is a private, residential undergraduate university affiliated with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Founded in 1891 in Brenham, Texas, TLU moved to Seguin in 1912. We are located approximately 30 miles east of San Antonio, 40 miles south of Austin, and 130 miles west of Houston. Outdoor recreation opportunities on the Guadalupe River, Lake McQueeney and many other water ways and parks are within easy driving distance. San Antonio and Austin provide many venues for entertainment, shopping, and cultural events.

Our most recent basic Carnegie classification is Baccalaureate Diverse Fields. Business Administration and Accounting, Kinesiology, Education, Biology, and Psychology are the top five majors and degrees awarded.

TLU has one of the most diverse student body populations in the nation, according to *US News* and *World Report's* annual college and university rankings. With the fall of 2010 enrollment, TLU became eligible for Hispanic Serving Institution status. In the fall 2011 term, TLU has maintained eligibility as a Hispanic Serving Institution with a 27% Hispanic population. Total fall 2011 student head count was 1415 with an entering freshmen class of 398.

We participate in NCAA division III athletics in the American Southwest Conference (ASC). Many of our athletes are chosen for the ASC Academic All Conference teams. Only athletes with a minimum 3.0 grade point average are chosen for this honor. Approximately 30% of our students participate in athletics.

At TLU, students participate in Theater, Visual Media, and the School of Music where they acquire professional level knowledge and skills in both the academic discipline and the performance of the art. For instance, in the School of Music a student may major in music or music education or participate in jazz band, string ensemble, woodwind ensemble, other bands and various choir groups while pursuing a career in another discipline. The opportunity to pursue an avocation as well as a career is available to all students and is a cornerstone of a well-rounded liberal arts education.

The quality of our faculty members and their dedication to teaching are among TLU's many strengths. Our students participate in faculty led student research, internships, conference presentations, and other high impact educational and co-curricular activities.

TLU, a community of faith and learning, offers a wide range of academic programs and prepares students to lead lives of purpose.





# What is the relationship of first generation, low income, and minority status on fall-to-fall freshmen retention?

### **Executive Summary**

Most of the factors that directly affect freshmen retention can be grouped into the main topics of academic preparedness and performance, engagement in and out of the classroom, and student motivation and goals. This special fact book section will focus on the first of these, academic preparedness and performance, specifically in relation to at-risk students that are first generation, low income, and/or minority status. First generation, low income, and minority status are well known characteristics of first time college freshmen most at risk of not retaining to their sophomore year. Students with these characteristics typically have lower SAT scores and lower college GPAs than their classmates that are not considered to be at risk of attrition.

### All First Time Freshmen from Fall 2009 and Fall 2010

#### First Generation, Low Income and Minority Status Students

Of the 685 freshmen in the two classes, 46% had no parent with at least a 4-year degree and were considered to be first generation college students. In the same population of students, 44% were considered to be from low income families and were eligible for federal Pell grants in their first TLU term. Freshmen that were other than white, international, or unknown ethnicity were considered to be minority status students and made up 43% of the two classes.

27% of all of the students in the two classes had no at-risk factors, 29% exhibited at least one of these factors, 23% had at least two at-risk characteristics, and 21% had all 3 at-risk factors.

#### **SAT Scores**

The average SAT score for all of the freshmen was 1021. For the first generation students, the average SAT score was 990, for low income students it was 987, and for minority students it was 967. In addition, a statistical comparison of SAT scores showed that scores of first generation students, low income students, and minority students were significantly lower than those of their classmates not is these student groups. These differences in SAT scores are not unique to TLU, but are consistently seen for these groups across the nation.

As the number of at-risk factors increase, there is a corresponding decrease in average SAT scores. For students who had no at-risk characteristics, the mean SAT score was 1082, while at the opposite end of the spectrum the mean SAT score for students with three at-risk factors was 945. Comparing the SAT scores of students by the number of risk factors also showed that students with one or more risk factors for attrition had significantly lower SAT scores.

#### First Term TLU GPAs

The average first term TLU GPA for all freshmen was 2.68. Average first term TLU GPAs for students with no atrisk factors was 2.93. For first generation students it was 2.55, for low income students it was 2.49, and for minority students it was 2.46. Similar to the comparison of SAT scores, students with any of these three at-risk factors had significantly lower first term TLU GPAs than students with no at-risk factors.

Of the 685 freshmen in this study, 29% did not return to TLU for their second fall semester. 35% of the non-returners were both first generation and low income students and 25% were first generation, low income, and of minority status.

Looking at students within the subset with no at-risk factors, 25% did not return for the following fall term. Within the group with one at-risk factor 26% were non-returners, within the group with two at-risk factors 34% were non-returners, and within the group with three at-risk factors 36% were non-returners.

### **SAT Scores of Non-Returners**

The average SAT score for all of the students who did not return for the fall of their sophomore year was 976. For first generation non-returners, the average SAT score was 960, for low income non-returners it was 957 and for minority status non-returners it was 934. The average SAT score for those students that were both first generation and low income was 957 and was 934 for non-returners with all three at-risk factors.

### **First Term TLU GPA of Non-Returners**

The average first term TLU GPA for all non-returners was 1.89. For first generation non-returners, the average first term TLU GPA was 1.84, for low income non-returners it was 1.77, and for minority status students it was 1.89.

It is interesting to note that average first term GPAs for non-returners with no at-risk factors and for those with only one at-risk factor were the same. However, those non-returning students who had two or three at-risk factors had lower GPAs than the rest of the non-returning students.

### **Conclusions**

While having first generation, low income, and/or minority status is not directly related to retention, belonging to any one of these groups is strongly related to SAT scores and to first term TLU GPAs. It is SAT scores and first term TLU GPAs that directly affect fall-to-fall freshmen retention. The higher the scores, the more likely the student will retain. It is also important to understand that many of our students have more than one at-risk factor. The more at-risk factors a student has, the lower his or her SAT score and first term GPA is likely to be, which in turn leads to a higher probability that the student will not return to TLU.

There are many reasons that students do not retain and persist to graduation. Only for some of these reasons can we successfully intervene. Under preparedness and academic performance are areas in which we can provide the services and resources to help our students stay at TLU to complete their education.
